Connecting Plus-wise

The meeting on 21st January was held in the bar area at Ladybridge Park where, for the first time, we were curtained off from the rest of the world, even enjoying the luxury of our own 'convenience'. There are two paid staff plus around fifty volunteers who accompany the fifty to sixty members both on group and one-toone activities. Whilst the charity is best known for its nurses who assist cancer sufferers and their families in their own homes, she described the wide range of services they are now able to provide. These vary from grants to someone who needs additional or special clothing to a 24 hour, seven days a week, help-line. Starting from a few donations in 1911 the charity is now worth £68 million.

Macmillan Cancer Relief -18th Amy herself had been involved in fund raising for a new consultation and treatment centre in Macclesfield. This had cost £1.5 million of which about £1.0 million had already been raised. She thanked Rotarians who had helped with collections at Handforth Green before Christmas, which had raised over £3000 in one day, the highest of any collection point in the country.
