

Meeting Reports



February

A lower number of members than usual, 22, attended despite the speaker's talk being on the subject of alcohol.

Chris produced a veritable feast consisting of Spicy Chilli Con Carne, Sweet & Sour Chicken, Fish Lasagne and Gammon steaks. The amount of food produced meant everyone could have 2 main courses but room had to be left for a pudding of Chocolate Sponge & Custard.

During the meal Michael Lacey followed up his e-mail of 13 February with an update on Bicycles for Africa and repeated that Council's proposal is to go for the full funding of £10,000 but retain a fall back position. The proposal was approved unanimously.

After coffee David Rose broke with tradition and introduced the speaker, Jiles Halling. David had carried out a great deal of research and gave a lengthy account of Jiles background in and out of the champagne business. Despite having his opening remarks sabotaged by David, Jiles explained

All about champagne on 21 that his knowledge of champagne developed from working for 7 years at Moet & Chandon.

> The champagne growing region is situated about 90 miles north east of Paris where the chalky soil and chilly climate combine to give ideal conditions for ripening champagne's three main grape varieties. Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier.It is the blend of these three grapes which gives champagne its distinctive flavour. The colour can range from Blanc de blanc which is white champagne made from Chardonnay grapes to the much less common Blanc de noir which is white champagne made from only black grapes. The regions chalky terroir is essential and the vines need to be planted in fissured soil where they can put down deep and wide root systems.

> Jiles explained that because the climate is SO marginal most champagne produced is non-vintage and will be blended with older champagne to give it roundness. Despite the time constraints Jiles talk was excellent and was pitched to cover a range of people's knowledge from the basic to the more expert. The

only negative point was that the corks PRO - nothing to report. remained firmly in the sample bottles Jiles brought with him!

Polio Plus Updated

A goodly attendance turned up on 14th March to hear about Polio Plus. Certain reservations were expressed privately that our speaker, Robbie Phillips of RC Stockport Lamplighter, had decided that we were not ready for his talk, as he did not appear until 15 minutes after we had started to eat. All was revealed – he had lost his way from the middle of Cheadle Hulme to the Ladybridge. He is not the first to have difficulty in finding our venue! However, normality was quickly resumed after another excellent meal from Chris - the best in 1050 according to Robbie.

Polio Plus has been going a long time. I can recall involvement in raising funds for this most worthy project early on in my Rotary life. To eradicate polio from the earth by 2000 was the aim. Now, several years later, eradication is far from complete and is not assured. In 2006 there were 1900 confirmed cases, with the inevitability of 'silent carriers' many more than these in number.

The remaining 'pockets' of polio (enormous in size) include parts of Nigeria and India, despite tremendous efforts to administer vaccine drops to the children. Part of the enormity of the problem is that each child needs up to ten separate vaccinations over a period of time to ensure protection, and this in crowded living situations,

often wretched slums, where many residents believe that the polio drops are actually harmful, possibly carrying the AIDS virus or a hidden contraceptive to reduce population numbers.

In Muslim northern Nigeria male health officials are not allowed to enter a household containing women unless the male head of the family is present. It was clear that sheer logistical nightmares have delayed this project, and will continue to do so. The longer it takes, the less likely it is that it will ever be completed in full.

The costs have been staggering. \$4 billion so far, with \$500 from RI. World health organisations and national health authorities have organised the vaccinations and have provided the staff. What started out as a Rotary inspired initiative has been taken up by governments globally. Rotary is still involved, mainly through volunteers helping with the vaccination programme. Eradication of polio clearly is an uphill struggle, but the target is very much worthwhile achieving to rid the world of this terrible disease.

Henry thanked Robbie on our behalf for his talk. Henry was himself applauded for his award of a Paul Harris Fellowship at the recent President's Evening at the Alma Lodge. Well done, Henry!

Holmes hopes to join RC Cambridge, that our matching grant and application for our bikes-for-Africa project has been submitted. Help was requested for an Eyeline collection in Dennis Allport Bramhall on 23 March. Our meeting on 28^{th} March will be at L'Ecole in Heaton Moor.

In other matters, we heard that John Graham Yule's raffle win and Sid's fining of honest Rotarians for imagined misdemeanours brought a thoughtful evening to an end.

View from the trenches

President Gordon hijacked me to write a few lines so here goes.

Blessings in disguise.

Years ago I had a next door neighbour who worked for Metro Vicks in Trafford Park. He went to night-school every winter and became well qualified with AMIMechE and AMIEE after his name. Metro Vick's closed down and made hundreds and hundreds redundant and Alan, my neighbour had a most miserable twelve months looking for work and attending interviews. He became quite disheartened.

Eventually he got an interview at the GCHQ listening centre near Cheltenham and I well remember his relating the day's experience. He described walking up a long drive to an old country mansion and entering a hallway lined in oak panelling and smelling of Brown Windsor soup. He was ushered into a room where an army Major with bristling moustache bade him sit down. Alan expected questions about his speciality at Metro Vicks which was aerials. Not a bit of it. The major asked – " Done any orienteering, Shackleton – any fell walking ?" and so on - nothing about aerials at all.

He got the job and moved with his family to a pretty rural village near Cheltenham.

For years he would visit Bramhall from time to time, somewhat more rotund and puffing happily at his pipe. He said that redundancy was the best thing that ever happened to him. He said "I have a cushy number with an inflation- proof pension coming up at 60"

The moral surely is that things that appear to be disasters often turn out to be blessings in disguise.

In the 8am Communion Service at my church the minister gives a very brief address and one which I remember reiterates this. He related a little story about a ship which sank in a storm and only one man survived by hanging on to a plank which eventually was washed up on a remote uninhabited island.
