# Energy efficiency or Baby, it's not cold outside

Climate change is here, but how far it goes is up to us.

The only way the government can act is by taxation, on fuels and vehicles. Without this imposition there are many things that you can do to reduce your carbon footprint, staring in your home.

- 'A' rated boiler (condensing type) 8.9 years
- Micro wind generator 10.5 years
- Solar water heating 54.7 years!
- Double glazing 97.6 years! (but you get a more comfortable house)

# Goodbye to all that

Well I've gone. 'At long last!' I hear the Rev Rabone cry. Yes, it's true, after nearly two years I've finally found a Rotary Club that's willing to take on the challenge. I am now a fully paid up (£110 per year!!) member of the Rotary Club of Cambridge (District 1080; RIBI No 94; Founded 1922 etc etc) with all of its 62 members, six honorary members and eight honorary life members.
