

In passing, he bemoaned the lack of credit for the accompanying text which he had "writ" but which had another's name on it.

Our speakers, of course, needed no introduction, which is exactly what they got. After a small panic over the projector, the excitement was so great that Bob S began the talk without waiting for the Speakers' Host to do his bit. David Rose was bemused but good-humoured about it. There was another little panic when President Bob lost his notes, but Sue



saved the day by finding them where he'd left them. (That's why we need lady members!)

Bob S and Oriane were taking this trip to celebrate special birthdays (Bob's fifteenth!) and by lucky coincidence met up with Sue and Bob P at points along the way, and for a final Birthday dinner. The two pairs of intrepid travellers took slightly different routes, Bob and Oriane visiting Chile, Argentina and Brazil, and Sue and Bob travelling to Tierra del Fuego, Paraguay, and Rio. We were treated to photographs of stunningly beautiful landscapes and seascapes, taken by both couples, and expertly compiled for our pleasure by Sue.

There were amazing photographs of glaciers which, we were told, are actually growing in this part of the world rather than shrinking, and the team were at pains to explain the noises created by them, and the excitement caused by their movements.

We were also transported to National Parks teeming with wildlife such as seals and sea lions, and thousands of penguins on their nesting sites. Sue and Bob sailed on a cloudy lake to see glowing pale blue icebergs but they drew the line at trekking up the glacier at the end of the lake, where large chunks regularly broke off. They did however brave the viewing platforms at the end of a second glacier to bring us a short video of the sights and sounds. In the high mountains of this northern park they met few people, but Bob seemed to have made good friends with a llama. We saw photographs of the dramatic Mt. Fitzroy, in a "walkers' paradise" but apparently Bob and Sue did not fancy climbing to the top - can't think why! By way of contrast to this natural beauty, in a small town they found abundant graffiti on its walls.

Oriane then showed us pictures of the Andes that she and Bob S flew over, followed by views of majestic buildings in Santiago. Naturally, they couldn't visit Chile without visiting "The Devil's Cellar", a vast store of Chilean wine. Buenos Aires also sported magnificent buildings, but also designated areas where people could demonstrate, especially about the Disappeared, those unfortunates who were taken by Government forces and never seen again. The city's cemetery boasted huge crypts and tombs, echoing the splendour of the city itself. Eva Peron is buried there. At last we came to the promised tango demonstration. Sadly it was not performed by Bob and Oriane, but by experts on video.

Meanwhile Bob P and Sue visited the Iguazu Falls on the Argentine-Brazilian border. This is the largest waterfall in the world, and the photographs reflected this. Sue and Bob both got soaked to the skin going on a boat trip under the falls.

We all strained our eyes to see Bob and Oriane on the beaches of Ipanema and Copacabana as well as their hotel's own beach, but they had obviously left the scene.

At the end of the talk Sid asked if they had visited a Welsh-speaking colony in the south of the continent, and went on to describe briefly his visit there with Sally. Then, at last, David Rose managed to get a word in and thank our four speakers, suggesting they should lead a salsa evening.

'elf and safety – the Navy Rules the Waves?

The Royal Navy is proud of its new fleet of Type 45 destroyers. Having initially named the first two ships HMS Daring and HMS Dauntless, the Naming Committee has, after intense pressure from Brussels renamed them HMS Cautious and HMS Prudence. The next five ships are to be named

HMS Empathy, HMS Circumspect, HMS Nervous, HMS Timorous and HMS Apologist.

Costing £850 million each, they meet the needs of 21st century and comply with the very latest employment, equality, health and safety and human rights. The new user-friendly crows' nest comes equipped with wheelchair access. Live ammunition has been replaced with paint balls to reduce the risk of anyone getting hurt and to cut down on the number of compensation claims. Stress counsellors and lawyers will be on duty 24 hours a day and each ship will have its on-board industrial tribunal. The crew will be 50/50 men and women and balanced in accordance with the latest Home Office directives on race, gender, sexuality and disability. Sailors will only have to work a maximum of 37 hours per week in line with Brussels Health and Safety rules, even in wartime! All vessels will come equipped with a maternity ward and nursery, situated on the same deck as the Gay Disco. Tobacco will be banned from the ship but cannabis will be allowed in the wardroom and messes.

All information on notice boards will be printed in 37 different languages and Braille. Crew members will now no longer be required to ask permission to grow beards – this applies equally to women crew members. The MoD is working on a new "non-specific" flag because the White Ensign is considered offensive to minorities. The Union Flag has already been discarded.

The Prime Minister has stated that "While these ships reflect the very latest in modern thinking, they are also capable of being up-graded to comply with any new legislation coming out of Brussels".

Rotary and the Clympics

Rotarians and RIBI Young Citizen Award winners were among those lucky few who carried the London Olympic Torch. Mike Thorn a member of the Rotary Club of Cheam carried the flame through Kent in July and Young Citizen Award winners Hannah Jones and Cameron Foster both

held the flame aloft to inspire others. Hannah from Chester aged 19 was diagnosed with a brain tumor at age 15 and since then has raised thousands of pounds and increased awareness of brain tumor research. Cameron broke his legs and arms after falling from a ski lift. He made a fully recovery but had to spend many weeks in a wheelchair unable to do anything. He has since devoted his life to help youngsters with disabilities to be involved with sport.

Ken Logan, a member of the Rotary Club of Braids in Scotland ran with the torch in June. Ken has helped with the administration of the Edinburgh Direct Aid charity where he has been involved in fundraising, sorting, collecting and delivering aid to Bosnia on eight separate occasions as well as raising over £10,000 by running marathons etc.

RIBI President Burman said "everyone involved with the Olympic Torch are truly amazing people. To have so many carrying the torch who are involved with Rotary really shows how active and valued Rotary is in the community".


Walthew House - 20th June

The meeting started off with the sad news that Judith Sheppard had recently passed away following a long illness. David Rabone provided a very sensitive prayer.

Our main guest this evening was Kathryn Sheldon who later gave the talk.

Various reports were given. Chris Monkhouse for instance advised that he was not homeless but did not at present own his own property.

After the toast to the Queen, the President announced that we should be back for 9.20 but as usual with the problems with unfortunately the projector the meeting did not re-adjourn until 9.30.



Kathryn Sheldon one of the four paid employees of Walthew House is in charge of the fundraising and endeavouring to spread the word of Walthew House, spoke to us advising that the house is for people who are losing their hearing and also to help blind people. Kathryn explained the home raised funds from various activities with only a small amount being provided by Stockport Council. Walthew House seek the support from many aspects of society, local MPs, friends and organisations such as Rotary. On the matter of blind people Kathryn advised that counselling is now available at Walthew House – Action for Blind People is providing this service so that the local people can have

easier access specifically for people with sight loss. The councillors are qualified and experienced when it comes to understanding things from a blind person's perspective. The councillors then help to get a clearer understanding of a blind person's feeling and the challenges they face. They offer free and confidential space for any issues that these people might have. These issues maybe about vision or it might be to be about a significant relationship, work or family matter. Further relatives and carers can have counselling separately with the organisation as well. A sight loss can mean a big change for the whole family.

To ensure the work of Walthew House charity is sustainable the house aim is to raise enough money each year to balance its books. This is an ever increasing challenge and for 2012/13 need a total of £185,000. They receive a grant of £30,000 each year from Stockport Council which will cover about 16% of their costs but the rest is raised by blood sweat and tears. Supermarket bag packing, Fetes, sponsored bravery and generous donations. Kathryn went on to say she was grateful for support from local companies and company organisations.

Kathryn finished by answering a number of questions and the session had to be guillotined at 10.15pm. The raffle was held and the prize not unexpectedly was given directly to Kathryn

The meeting was concluded by this week's S @ Arms Vida who managed to fine everyone.

Rotary finished at 10.29 so everyone left at a decent time.

KfM& Concert Band (King Edward Musical Society)





A serious guide to fixing your own computer



Computers can be very frustrating but there are a few simple rules you can follow to solve most of them. Please keep this list handy near your computer.

RULE 1 – Read The Manual (RTM). All computers/ printers/broadband devices/programs etc. come with some form of instructions or help file, usually on the installation disc. You <u>MUST</u> read these before calling for help. If there is any part of the manual you don't understand, type the offending phrase into Google and someone, somewhere will have explained it. <u>You wouldn't expect to be able to play a musical instrument without a lot of effort on your part and the same goes for computers.</u>

Rule 2 – See rule 1. AGAIN. I'm really not kidding!

Reboot – In case of a serious fault, ALWAYS try shutting down and restarting making sure that you restart any external devices as well. This includes your broadband router/modem. In the case of BT routers, there is a tiny hole into which you can stick a straightened paperclip to reset it.

Can't get onto the Internet – If all the leads are in place and the power is on to the external modem/router and you've reset your modem/router, phone your provider to see if there are any faults in the area. If you have a neighbour with broadband, ask them to check on your provider's website. In some cases, anti-virus programs can develop faults and stop email/internet contact. If in doubt, type your fault description into Google.

Computer running slow – Download the free program 'ccleaner' and run it. You can get this from http://download.cnet.com/windows/ (where you can choose between AVG Free Anti-Virus, Ccleaner and other stuff) but read the instructions first and find out how to download and use it. If you stopped reading at the phrase 'download the free program' because you don't know how to download - see Rule 1.

My hard disc failed and I've lost all my data — Did you make backups? If not, you've lost all your data. Invest in an external hard drive or, at the very least, copy important documents to a memory stick. If you don't know how to do this, type 'copying files to an external device' into Google.

I've got a strange message on my screen – Type it into Google and see what other people are saying. The chances are 99.9999% that someone else has had the same message.

My printer isn't working — Is it connected/switched on? Have you bought cheap inks, are they fitted correctly? HP printers are fairly forgiving of cheaper cartridges (although the print quality will not be as good), Canon are less so and Epson shouldn't have anything but their own cartridges within a hundred light years.

I'm writing a document/email etc and don't know how to —At the top of the keyboard are a row of function keys, press F1 and a help box will appear. Type a description of what you want to do into that and press the Enter (Return) key to finish.

I've received an attachment in an email and can't open it

- The chances are that you don't have the correct program to open it but look for the three or four letter extension (.pdf, .docx etc) and type into Google 'Why can't I open files of type xxx'

Keep ALL documentation and discs safely—When you dispose of an item, get rid of these too.

And finally - SEE RULE 1

And if all else fails – See Rule 2

These are all real answers to real problems and will solve most of your computer faults.

Remember

- Microsoft NEVER ring you up and tell you that there's a fault on your computer.
- Nigerians do NOT want to give you lots of money.
- If an email has an attachment and it looks suspicious, don't open it, just delete it.
- Empty the 'Deleted Items' folder regularly.

Handover 27th June



Proceedings began in traditional Rotary fashion with a delay in both first and second courses. Michael took the opportunity to tell us about his adventures trying to see the Olympic Torch, and it transpires that several members went to significant lengths to see a candle in the rain. In a departure from the norm, Vida was not first for pudding.

After coffee the meeting proper

got underway with the transfer of the President's chain from Bob Stevenson to Brian Dougal. Following the expected words from each, it fell to the officers and committee chairmen to set out their stalls, so to speak.

Sue, as chairman of Membership, declared herself quite excited at the prospect of trying to increase numbers by 10%, with the emphasis on younger new members (under 50), without neglecting the talents of older members. As Vice-president she said she had lots to learn, but was confident of help from colleagues.

There was no handover of the treasurer's badge, as Gill was away, and the badge wasn't around either. The secretary's badge was passed from Brian to Michael, who promptly reverted to treasurer mode and told us that £6,500 was on its way to St. Anne's Hospice.

John Thewlis was next on his feet as chairman of Ways and Means. He looked back to the Duck Race, which though very successful, raises relatively little money for a great deal of effort. Nonetheless, there is no question of suspending it as it publicises Rotary so very effectively. That other great publicity-earner, the Christmas float, was also mentioned: the trailer needs a lot of work to renovate it, but we have a fair bit of cash to do it.

I then reread my "mission statement" for the Community Services committee, and was later rebuked, quite correctly, by David Walker, for neglecting to mention the efforts of our very own volunteer Fire Prevention Officers.

David Rose, of International and Foundation, announced that he was trying to get a matching grant for our donation to the Uganda enterprise championed by Sue P and Gill. The objective is to train villagers in the crafts of sewing and knitting so that they may increase their income. Da-

vid also mentioned Alan's on-going efforts for Vision Aid Overseas, and said that he was also hoping to set up a local peace forum before going to the international one in Berlin later this year.

Next, Ian Dobson gave a commendably concise resume of his ongoing communication activities, followed by Vida's substitution for Caroline of Club Services - she was even briefer.

The last chairman to speak was John Sykes of Social, who confirmed the dates of Charter Night (12.9.12 at the Deanwater) and President's Night on 8.3.13, also at the Deanwater. Also mooted was a Thai banquet suggested by Jan Hubbard. Other ideas for social events are very welcome. President Brian commented that we should have a progressive supper this year, after years of discussing it.

Finally, we welcomed governor nominee Derek Newman of Manchester Breakfast. He gave a well-rounded view of district's current position, representing both Robert Strachan, the DG elect, and Mr Tanakasan the new RI President. This year's motto is "Peace through service", although two clubs will be doing no such thing: both Wythenshawe and Didsbury clubs have closed. District 1050 will however continue for a handful more years as the threat of amalgamation is lifted.

A lesson in manufacturing

A toothpaste factory had a problem: they sometimes shipped empty boxes, without the tube inside. This was due to the way the production line was set up, and people with experience in designing production lines will tell you how difficult it is to have everything happen with timings so precise that every single unit coming out of it is perfect 100% of the time. Small variations in the environment (which can't be controlled in a cost-effective fashion) mean you must have quality assurance checks smartly distributed across the line so that customers all the way down to the supermarket don't get pissed off and buy another product instead.

Understanding how important that was, the CEO of the toothpaste factory got the top people in the company together and they decided to start a new project, in which they would hire an external engineering company to solve their empty boxes problem, as their engineering department was already too stretched to take on any extra effort.

The project followed the usual process: budget and project sponsor allocated, RFP, third-parties selected, and six months (and £8 million) later they had a fantastic solution — on time, on budget, high quality and everyone in the project had a great time. They solved the problem by using high-tech precision scales that would sound a bell and flash lights whenever a toothpaste box would weigh less than it should. The line would stop, and someone had to walk over and yank the defective box out of it, pressing another button when done to re-start the line.

A while later, the CEO decides to have a look at the ROI of the project: amazing results! No empty boxes ever shipped out of the factory after the scales were put in place. Very few customer complaints and they were gaining market share. "That's some money well spent!" – he says, before looking closely at the other statistics in the report.

It turns out, the number of defects picked up by the scales was 0 after three weeks of production use. It should've been picking up at least a dozen a day, so maybe there was something wrong with the report. He filed a bug against it, and after some investigation, the engineers come back saying the report was actually correct. The scales really weren't picking up any defects, because all boxes that got to that point in the conveyor belt were good.

Puzzled, the CEO travels down to the factory, and walks up to the part of the line where the precision scales were installed.

A few feet before the scale, there was a £20 desk fan, blowing the empty boxes off of the belt and into a bin.

"Oh, that," says one of the workers — "one of the guys put it there cause he was tired of walking over every time the bell rang".
