

Kay Kelly: Eyeline

On the day of my granddaughter's 5th birthday (10th January), 32 people (5 of whom were guests) gathered for this routine looking speaker evening. It was obviously not routine because we

had Sam, Dev, Graham Y, David McK and Malcolm all present together!

After a moment's silence for Tony Jones, a recently deceased, long serving member of Stockport Rotary, John K gave an appropriate grace.

Doesn't he do them well? Michael stunned everyone by describing the White Book as "interesting and worth a look".

Our speaker was Kay Kelly, who had been with Eyeline for only 3 months. She reminded us that it was her first public appearance and in front of one of the trustees (Henry) too! Eyeline or Eyeline SIB is the "trading name" used by the Stockport institute for the blind, dumb and deaf. It concentrates these days on the visually impaired, but rents out the upstairs of Walthew House at a peppercorn rent for deaf purposes. There are estimated to be some 5,000 visually impaired in Stockport with about 1,500 registered blind. Eyeline provides services to about 1,500 (not the same as the registered!) As well as producing a very popular newsletter they run at Walthew House classes in craft, Braille, dancing and hand bell ringing amongst others. They also organise social events, luncheons and day trips. They have a help desk (often manned by Henry) at Stepping Hill and run a befriending service with trained volunteers who visit, help with things like paying the bills or going for a walk, thereby providing company.

Eveline is carrying out a major review of what it does and will have new objectives following this. These will include the need to balance the budget and the need to spread the word (e.g. Michael via the Daily Living Skills class).

Kay described the resource centre which contains all sorts of things to make life easier with poor or no vision - such as talking lids for tins of beans (or was it soup?) and a talking microwave.

Kay concluded with telling us how we can help - two ways: finance and volunteers (especially an accountant and a lawyer).

View from the trenches

Gordon invited me to pen my thoughts 'from the trenches' on a subject I chose, from guinea pigs to Rotary. We used to have guinea pigs, but they died long ago. So it had better be Rotary.

I was in Round Table until I was 41 and thoroughly enjoyed it . Rotary was a natural follow-on for many. However, I was very busy at work, traveling all over the place, and making sure I did not fall off the promotion ladder. A weekly commitment was too much to contemplate for many years. Eventually, I decided that I could think again about Rotary and I went several times to RC Poynton, where I knew several people already. About this time, a new Rotary club was mooted in Bramhall, so this suited me even better and I became a founder member. I've never regretted this decision (well, not often!). In my view you can't really be a Rotarian unless you get involved, and I determined to do my bit when I was able -12 years on Council for starters -9 of these as Secretary.

I find many aspects of Rotary very fulfilling – the friendships, a common approach to 'putting something back into the community' from which I have benefited so much, the satisfaction that working together brings and the widening of perspectives that speakers and members allow. Some great memories remain – our trip to Plonsk in Poland with hospital supplies and some of the early Bramfests, to name but two.

But I also find some aspects of Rotary unappealing – excessive paperwork and bureaucracy and the percentage of subs that has to go to fund this. I must confess that I've never been an enthusiastic District person. For me, Rotary is about the club. We couldn't be a world organisation without District, National and the rest of course, but - oh – some of their antics leave me cold.

At times, Rotary can be inspirational and to belong to an organisation of like-minded folks that can really make a difference is something I am really proud about. We are fortunate in having a club low in pretentiousness, with a healthy streak of humour and banter – very much like the Round Table I used to know. Long may it continue and flourish!

Bicycles for Africa

We have a golden opportunity to really benefit many people and families in Africa by sending them unwanted bikes from the UK

A man's bike can create employment as a load carrier or for water/fuel distribution, or by adaptation as a family transport. A woman's bike would be given to a nurse, midwife or care worker (in sub-Sahara Africa 25% of the population, including babies and kids are HIV+) where children as young as 8 or 9 are bringing up their siblings. A smaller bike saves a child from having to walk up to 4 hours a day to attend school.

Some of the bikes can be adapted to tow stretcher trailers, acting as an ambulance If we can raise £4000 (or £2000 if we can obtain match funding from District) a container can be sent to (say Namibia) with 400 bikes, the container becoming a workshop in the more remote districts. This is £10 per bike, which we need to raise from the bike donors themselves (not too difficult, Γ 've had 70% success rate so far) kindhearted people, sponsorship or armed robbery. £10 isn't very much to change someone's life.

The Club has given a provisional commitment this month, but wouldn't it be fantastic if we could make it self-funding!
