Meeting Reports



NW Air Ambulance

Our president arrived on 24th chance of recovery is to be assured. The November with only seconds to spare majority of calls are to traffic incidents confessing that he was busy watching TV or something. We believe him, we really do.

David Rabone was congratulated for making his introduction to the grace, longer than the verse itself but the excellent (and plentiful) food was worth saying thanks for.

Our speaker, Bryn Butler explained that he became a volunteer after being rescued from Lyme Park by air ambulance whilst out on a walk and that his wife's concern for his plight was somewhat mitigated by her desire to get the car keys from his pocket before he was whisked away.

Founded in 1999, the NW air ambulance service has flown over 10,000 missions in their two helicopters based at Blackpool and Barton. They have staff in emergency centres and when a call comes in for an ambulance, the staff make the decision whether a normal land ambulance or a helicopter is most suited to the type of accident and the terrain. The speed of response is also a critical factor as the first 60 minutes of an incident can be vital if the Gordon

Each crew consists of one pilot and two paramedics with only the salaries of the latter being met by government. The remainder of the 4 million annual running costs are met by donations from the public and industry. They currently have 3 crews but would like 4 to give greater cover. Donations and offers of help can be given through their website www.nwaa.net which is well worth a visit.

Vida, standing in for Henry, gave the vote of thanks and Michael announced that we can now accept donations via our website, which now looks great thanks to Brian.

The People's History Museum

The speaker at the meeting on 12th January was Phil Dunn, curator and registrar of the People's History Museum based in Spinningfields (www.phm.org.uk). Manchester concerns itself with the development of democracy in the UK and the move towards universal suffrage since 1832. Unsurprisingly it was set up by a group of Marxists in London in1935 and moved to Manchester in 1989. In 2007 it got a Heritage Lottery grant to establish the rather splendid premises it occupies today. Iit is an independent, non party political(!) charity funded by the grant the city council, trade unions, the Coop and others. It generates exhibitions, by staging corporate events and by charging a pound to get in. Its prize exhibits are a large collection of marching banners used at demos, processions and rallies,

plus pamphlets leaflets and photos used for largely political purposes. The banners are very good examples of the genre, the oldest dating to 1832. They have great expertise in the conservation of these objects. We got an extensive viewing on the screen of the best examples. Having thanked Phil for his efforts via Bruce the Elder we moved on.

Michael admitted we do not know how much we give to Foundation and he needs more info. from donors and non donors.

Sixth Form and Bramhall High

Once the regalia of office (Bell and pennants) arrived together with Harry the evening began with Grace on January 19th. As usual, a fine meal was made available to all and enjoyed to the full, more by some than others.

The evening business began with Apologies, with the unusual event of two apologies' being present. Brian advised of updates to the web site which includes a count down clock to the Duck race meet. He also confirmed the meeting of 2nd Feb would host members from Round Table to discuss the future of the Christmas float and how it may be able to continue with the reduction of their members. David Rose (with apologies for short notice) advised of a 'Free Food, music and cultural evening' at the International Society in Manchester on the evening of Monday 24th January. John Sykes requested a volunteer to help with the next 'blind run' and one was found. Harry advised the Rossi Quartet, part of the Hallé, are to perform at Bramhall Methodist Church on the 11th February - tickets available at various outlets. John Meeus advised about an alternative menu for Burns night and circulated a list for members to confirm their preferences. No further committee reports were offered.

Then main speaker of the evening was Scott Thomas from Bramhall High School who gave an impassioned talk on the subject of 6th form academic education. It would seem the major issue is that Aquinas College is the preferred 6th form college for the Stockport area and selection to it is something of a lottery unless one is of the Catholic faith or has siblings already there. To get to an interview it is necessary to be among the first X number of applicants to telephone after a given time on a given day without consideration to academic ability or effort - one the allocation of places is reached no further names are taken. Other 'better' 6th form colleges such as Wilmslow and Poynton operate on a geographical basis so people from central Stockport are severely disadvantaged.

To overcome this, a proposal has been made to Stockport Education committee to open a 6th form at Bramhall High This has been rejected by Stockport and the new proposal is to change the school to academy status and start the 6th form as part of this change. Seemingly there is adequate class room space available at present to accommodate the additional students although longer term replacement

the cost of the teaching element will be self funding as each student attracts funding which increases with age. The proposal is to be discussed by the Student Council and put to the school board for further discussion.

A short discussion followed with members broadly in favour of an academic college although it was pointed out that the reason for 6th form colleges in their present format was to provide a broader education opportunity than a pure academic one.

John Meeus proposed a vote of thanks to Scott for an informative talk and referenced a 16 year old student who once spoke equally eloquently at the Conservative conference but could not Trevor Saville recall what happened to him.

Tanzania update

On my return from Tanzania, I stated that there was little point in pouring money into a situation that would result in very little of it reaching the intended recipients and that is still my view. The initial aim was to set up an educational system whereby technicians could be trained in the repair of hospital equipment and perhaps set up a single point of entry for the hospitals in the region to receive machinery that was in working order complete with manuals and correct voltage settings. It soon became clear that the prevailing culture was one that did not reward technicians for their skills or even want to encourage the repair of equipment when replacements could be obtained for free or simply done without. As I stated at the time – the will does not exist in the country to develop this further.

We did however, send a Rotary toolbox to the Usa River Children's Centre and this, despite the best attempts of the customs officials, has now got there and is in use.

In an attempt to develop some kind of support network for those people working in the country in some kind of technical role, I set up a Yahoo group called Africafix along the lines of our bwrotary, to encourage people to share problems and possible solutions. There are some members of Engineering World Health in this group and they have been helpful in getting technicians from Tanzania and Rwanda to join. So far, there have been only two requests for information, one of which I was able to help with, but when the next cohort of students are sent out to Tanzania, we should see an increase in use.

One of the students in Tanzania was Rebecca Souder who loved the country so much that she has gone back there of her own accord to work in her original profession of chemical engineer with a company who develop water filters to remove some of the very high levels of fluoride which occur naturally in the area and cause bone deformities. Her original trip was funded by a Rotary club in America and she has made contact with one of the clubs I visited in order to act as an intermediary to further the aims of the engineering group. My attempts to involve the local Rotary clubs in Tanzania have not met with the success I hoped. In fact, I have been quite disappointed with their lack of response. Each club I visited stated that they were very keen to investigate links with us in order to develop a support programme but they have failed to respond to emails asking for further contact. I hope Rebecca can reverse this.

I continue to hope that we can offer support the work going on in Africa but on a practical rather than a monetary basis.
