Meeting Reports

Silk Museum Visit 31 March 2004

Chauffeur John arrived at the HERITAGE CENTRE to find a couple of forlorn Rotarians outside the locked door. After two laps of the Silky Way in a formula one Mondeo aided by 21st century technology the air-traffic controller, aka John Sykes, we landed at Park Street.

Fourteen including several ladies were introduced to our guide. Richard explained these museums were the first to cover all aspects of the silk industry and Macclesfield, mentioned in the Doomsday Book, gained Borough status in 1261.

Paradise Mill We entered (?misnomer) the site of the first throwing mill built by Charles Roe, a copper merchant from wealthy Alderley Edge, to the second floor. This unique handloom weaving room was crammed with silent machines previously water powered by the River Bollin. Richard backdated to the 17th century when the raw material was imported from the Far East to prepare the yarn, then to Spitalfields for luxury goods and ceremonial items. In the late 1780s the hand looms needed the nimble fingers of women and children to produce strengthened yarn for conversion by men in the weavers' garrets. 18th

century technology failed to work despite "Rotarian advisors". We now had problems differentiating the warp from the weft!

I was fascinated with "the father of the punch-card system" the incredible jacquard process imported from Paris around 1820. At last our footloose guide demonstrated how the perforated cards, designed in the end room, facilitated the weaving of intricate patterns. Over the decades the industry went from boom to slump with an up-lift during the war and silk, a strong material, was used for parachutes.

A walk through the fake Director's office albeit with authentic equipment ended the tour. We returned to the art school and shop for wine and female retail therapy. The tribe minus three wandered across the elegant Park Green to the Raj restaurant aided by a local Geordie! We ordered our main dishes except our President who, believe it or not, was advised by his loyal cocoon Mary.

John regained control as home navigator. We enjoyed the evening but suggest the provision of ordnance survey maps in future.

There are 530 Districts worldwide, and all DG's meet for a week in Annaheim, but in 2006/07 the venue will change to San Diego. There are approx 1.2 million Rotarians in 36600 Clubs. Mike explained how DG's are elected in USA- something about self ------- farts (Fearless American Rotary Trustees). Of course, things are different in RIBI and all DG's are properly elected.

We have 47 Clubs in our District 1050, and we are the 2nd smallest District in RIBI (1200 members) and probably the 2nd smallest in RI – normally Districts have 2000+ members.

Legislation Council meet this year and there is a strong possibility that they will make some important decisions – the regularity of meetings is one topic to be debated. DG is the only person in District who is an officer of RI. The day to day matters are handled by Executive Committee.

Whilst Mike did not fully explain what District does, he certainly detailed how it is constructed and what we as Rotarians get for our District Subs. He took questions which were mainly slanted towards requesting less beurocracy.

It is going to be difficult to steer a steady course. After several questions from the floor, Bob said that the problems with possible inflation was not as serious as the one of deflation. Basically speaking, Bob was against joining Europe at this time.

Regarding identity cards, he suggested that this country needs ID cards to protect the majority. He quoted his own country Germany, who relaxed the rules on foreign entry. reunion with East Germany, a census found an extra 5,000,000 people they couldn't account for. Now Germany has closed it's borders. They send people with no identification back. He forecasted more difficulties now with 25 nations in E.U. There is a possibility with good ID the "big brother" scenario that governments employ, could be reduced.

Alan Newsome then gave a wholesome vote of thanks for such an excellent talk.

David Rabone reminded Rotarians that next Monday evening at the Deanwater was to meet the GSE teams and consequentially there would be no Rotary meeting next Wednesday. There would however be a joint meeting of the old and new committee chairmen instead.



Ambassadorial Scholarships

The District Foundation Committee has now secured funding to allow them to offer an Academic year Ambassadorial Scholarship for the year commencing September 2005.

Applicants must have completed at least 2 years of University or college course work, or have been employed in a recognized vocation for at least 2 years, when the Scholarship begins. They must be citizens of a country where there is a Rotary Club and

initial applications must be made through a Rotary Club, located in the applicants legal or permanent residence, or place of full time study or employment in the District. Candidates must be able to converse in the language of the Country where they hope to Study.

Applications from Rotaract Clubs are eligible and a disability will not bar an applicant. There are conditions which bar lineal descendants of a Rotarians.

Peace Scholarships

Do you know someone who is a good negotiator? Rotary International is offering Peace Scholarships to study Peace and Conflict Resolution in 200512007 year at one of the seven Study Centres worldwide. Scholarships are offered on a World Competitive basis and each Rotary District may submit one Candidate. Worldwide 70 Scholarships funded from Rotary International funds and applications are being received now with a closing date of 31't July 2004. The course is a 2 year masters-level Degree programme in conflict resolution.

Applicants will have an academic background, training and the work experience required for this programme. They must be proficient

in more than one language, have excellent leadership skills and have demonstrated a commitment to Peace and International understanding through their personal lives, community service and activity.

Applications must be made through a Rotary Club situated in the applicant's permanent residence area, place of full time study or of employment.

UK candidates would study at one of the 7 Rotary Centres abroad.

Paul was only a member of our club for just over two years, the last year of which was spent in enduring his illness, before his death aged 52. Nevertheless, during the time he was with us we experienced his quirky sense of humour, his organisational abilities and his skill as a raconteur.

It takes time to get to know people in our club, and more often than not it is at an event outside our normal meetings where individuals get to know each other. I got to know Paul better when a ten pin bowling evening went sadly wrong. For a start only five people turned up. Then the first available lane was timed at 9.30 pm (we met at 7.30). Paul suggested we scrapped the bowls and have an Indian instead, and it just so happened that there was one across the road that he could recommend. We wined and dined and chatted until late with Paul's fund of stories about people he knew sparking the conversation.

Those of us who attended his funeral heard further examples of his exploits, certainly during his younger days, and the whole event was a celebration of his life. The music was not mournful – it consisted mainly of popular music marking various high points in the life of the family – and a young Roman Catholic priest who sported a football shirt beneath his vestments conducted the service with great sincerity. It was an occasion for laughter, although tears and the sense of loss were never far away.

There is little doubt that Paul had the potential to be a great Rotarian, and our sense of loss must be that he did not have the time to realise that potential. We will also miss his humour, his friendship, his commitment.
