Duck Race Report

We decided to do something a bit bigger this year and as usual we held the event at Bramall Hall. The day started off overcast and a little grey and the weather forecast over the preceding few days had been rather foreboding. The stalwart early morning volunteers set about erecting gazebos, putting up tables and setting chairs ready for the days events. As it happened, not a drop of rain hit the ground at any time during the day, the sun came out to smile upon us and it turned into a fabulous and fantastic day.

We raised funds for The Royal Manchester Children's Hospital and, through the efforts of Rotarians and the opportunities offered by Morrison's, Waitrose, Handforth Dean, Woodford Park Garden Centre, Bramall Hall and Park and The Bramhall Centre, we were able to start four races with a thousand ducks in each race. We also had three 'speciality' races where giant ducks had been decorated by patients of the Hospital, celebrity patrons and local shops and traders. (More about these later).

In the courtyard of the Hall there was a fire engine with its hoses laid out and water being played on to the flower borders of the garden. There were also a variety of vehicles from Greater Manchester Police which were being 'guarded' by a couple of officers in vintage police uniforms. A lot of interest was shown, particularly by children, in the kit from the TAU (Tactical Aid Unit) vehicle. We were also very pleased to have 10 supercars amongst the trees which revved their engines from time to time – one even spat fire from it's exhaust, which intrigued many onlookers

Round the corner, on the Croquet Lawn, we had a quieter Performing Arts 1 area where there was line dancing, a ladies Morris Dancing group and students from Bramhall School of Dancing showing traditional folk dances from around the world. Everyone was encouraged to join in and dance with them.

There was a four hour live broadcast on the local radio station ImagineFM during which they did some live interviews, one with a race winner (Nigel Cuthbert) and another with our President Graham Yule. ". (These sound bites are available for a small donation) ImagineFM Chief Executive Paul Taylor said that it was been the best event they had ever been to and that the day had been "great.". A vote of thanks is due to the radio station for their help in providing a fantastic PA system.

In the Craft Village there were more than a dozen craft and interest stalls selling goods ranging from the honey from bees – Stockport Beekeepers Assoc. had brought along a real hive with bees! - to stained glass, with a workshop run by Julie of Illuminarte, jewellery, soft toys and a delicatessen.. We had some on-site catering of crepes (0000 posh eh?) and probably one of the smartest burgers stalls in the country provided by Special Edge Catering. I heard many people say "That is definitely NOT a burger van!"

The manager of the Lower Meadow Site had a hectic time organising the setting up for the Craft Village as well as the Games Village and Performing Arts 2. and the Tote marquee. During the afternoon entertainment was provided by the full orchestra from the Bramhall High School who gave us two excellent 40 minute concerts and the Brinnington Samba Band in complete contrast.

The Games Village was run by the Club with such exciting things as a Treasure Hunt and bouncy castle, tin can and coconut shies plus many more and there was a bookstall staffed by Rotary wives.

We had sold enough 'ducks' to be able to run four races. We then interspersed these with three 'speciality' giant duck races. We decided that it would be good for the patients of the Hospital to be involved so arranged with their Charity Team to have 10 ducks decorated by children patients and they contested The Humphrey Handicap. (Humphrey being the Hospital's mascot). The Hospital also has some celebrity patrons and they managed to get 7 decorated by stars from radio, football and television. These along with other suitably sponsored ducks were going beak to beak for The Sponsor's Stakes which was started by Jason Done, of Waterloo Road fame. Strangely, it was Jason's duck which ran away, winning a cup for him in the process. The last race was a hotly contested affair because we had involved many of the local business and traders and they did battle in The Duck Derby. There was a lot of public interest in the speciality race concept and there was also a lot of interest shown in the Tote betting system used on the day. Particularly by Rotarians where there was quite a lot of head scratching going on as money changed hands! It was great to have the final one thousand duck race, The Waddle and Quack Chase started by our District Governor Margaret Hutchinson.

Over 4000 people came along. They certainly spent their money and we managed to generate over £11,300 and raised the profile of the Bramhall and Woodford Rotary Club in the process. Thanks to everyone helped on the day, those who gave their time freely and those that bought ducks. Ian

March 23rd - Serendipity and science Club Secretary, the one and only Brian (Dougal), that he is updating our Club Constitution in line with current RI guidelines. The approved version will be available for members to inspect before the end of the Rotary Year. It seems to your correspondent that we have Hobson's choice on this one, although I may be wrong. Other interventions were made by Vida canvassing support for Easter Day's Bouncy castle at Bramhall Hall and by John Thewlis in connection with the Duck Race, THE The major topic for debate during the BIG ONE, scheduled for Sunday May Ways and Means have really worked hard and pulled out all the stops to make this event as successful as possible. We should be proud of them. Now it is the turn of members of the club to help to sell tickets and, if at all possible, to help on the day. Let's see if we can make the target of 3000 tickets to be sold before the day and 2000 tickets on the day itself. What a contribution to the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital this would be.

After the coffee break Jean Layton gave us a very well researched and prepared talk on serendipity in science. We learnt how the German physicist Röntgen first observed the phenomenon that led him to take an X-ray of his hand, how Fleming discovered penicillin and how Albert Hofmann sampled LSD and then cycled home, "Bicycle day," under its influence. As he recorded "little by little could begin Ι to enjoy the unprecedented colors and plays of shapes that persisted behind my closed eyes. Kaleidoscopic, fantastic images surged in on me, alternating, variegated, opening and then closing themselves in circles and spirals, exploding in colored fountains, rearranging and hybridizing themselves in constant flux." We also learnt how in 1856 W. H. Perkin Jim Thomas discovered mauveine, the first synthetic

dyestuff that led to the creation of the UK's dyestuffs industry when he was trying to make the anti-malaria drug quinine. (Perkin's son, W. H. Perkin junior who became the UK's dominant professor of organic chemistry at the time was based at Manchester University from 1892 - 1912 before he left to go to Oxford.) Finally, of course, we learnt how the American drugs giant Pfizer, when trying to develop a new treatment for angina, found that although their new drug, sildenafil citrate, failed in the clinic, it did have other uses - it is now sold as Viagra and is worth more than a few bob - not that any members of the club would be interested in its use. (As an aside Viagra was discovered at the Pfizer laboratories in Sandwich, Kent, along with other drugs, not the least fuconazole, which is a front-line treatment for fungal infections. Pfizer are now in the process of closing these laboratories down to save money.)

Finally, John Thewlis, the S at A. fined everyone who had unfairly fined him in the past, all the usual suspects and the "goody-goodies' i.e. everyone else.

The Red Cross: Karen Jones

Our Vice Pres. Bob Stevenson in the absence of President Graham was in the Chair on 13th April and got things underway with a brief but meaningful grace from Rev.Rabone. As has now become the custom miscellaneous items were covered prior to and during the course of the meal. We were sobered by the announcement from David Burstow of the passing of Hazel Grove Rotarian Jack Hewitt. A number of our members new Jack as he was a founder member of Poynton R.C. and in recent years was in the Hazel Grove club. His funeral was announced as being on 14 April. Other meaningful reports followed with John Thewlis berating 3 non-attendees at the first weekend of duck ticket sales. Brian laboured through the re-election of 2 of our 3 Honorary Members, at which point your reporter requested the correct spelling of "tosh"! Anyhow all ended well with Mark Hunter remaining and Mac declared as a "Lifetime Hon. Member".

David Walker decided to continue confusing us after Brian's precedent with a slightly disjointed series of apologies. Geoff applauded the club for

stalwart efforts at "Stroke Awareness Day". Vida and the team were thanked and it is believed that potentially serious conditions were uncovered in some members of the public.

After the coffee break Bruce The Younger introduced our speaker Karen Jones of "The British Red Cross" by emphasising the huge worldwide scale of "The International Red Cross", comparing it with the minnow status of "Rotary International", all of which was borne out by the most fluent and comprehensive presentation by Karen. Continuing the theme of scale it was revealed that there are 97 million volunteers worldwide in the Red Cross represented in186 countries and thus takes the accolade of being the world's largest organisation. The motto is to "Help people across the world wherever and whoever they are". Neutrality is the byword of the organisation and I guess it came as no surprise to learn that the founder was a Swiss gentleman by the name of Henry Dunant, thus sponsoring Geneva as their worldwide headquarters and the famous Geneva Convention. It dates back to 1859 and we had an impressive sweeping overview of the activities of the organisation from then right up to

date with the current crisis in Japan. There were many details given by Karen of specific initiatives taken by The Red Cross, but I will provide only a glimpse from my comprehensive note taking as follows:-

1914 Joint ambulance service formed.

World War 2 – 20 million food parcels delivered

Main helpers to blood transfusion service up to 1997

300,00 people get safe water every day Involved in such diverse areas as Vietnam, Live Aid, Lockerbie, Haiti earthquake, New Zealand, Japan, Ivory Coast, the list goes on.

The 7 fundamental principles were detailed as; Humanity, Impartiality, Neutrality, Independence, Voluntary Service, Unity and Universality. We were also treated to a fine array of fund raising methods and achievements with kindred feelings being demonstrated as our Rotary course runs very much in parallel with theirs, albeit of a different scale. Interestingly The Red Cross claims to b e the third most recognised "Brands" in the world behind Tony

The problem being exacerbated by the everincreasing world population especially in the developing countries. The answer to this problem is to progress the use of natural resources for energy generation, recycling of waste productions, and as example, samples of which were passed round, and the reduction of landfill. Switzerland was given as an excellent of the latter in that it was stated to have no landfill now. However this was contradicted by one of our members, who lives there part time by stating that in his village everything went into a big hole in the ground and was not sure what happened to it after that.

There was little that we did not know already and the main questions were regarding how this was relevant to Rotary. Various projects were quoted including litter clearance, ground clearance of overgrowth allotments and advice to schools, scout groups and other youth organisations on the subject of world pollution.

Our Council will of course discuss this matter and probably appoint an Environment Officer or not as the case maybe.
