as well as in Woodford. Our speaker on the 8th was Frank Ward, District Community Service Convenor, who brought greetings from the District Governer and the Manchester club. He said that Community Service is the expression of our main aim of service above self and is the second oldest aim of Rotary after that of fellowship. He emphasised that in a Rotarian C.S. project, only the best will do and warned against attempting schemes which are too ambitious. He listed a number of schemes which are operating in the District which are simple, inexpensive and worthwhile. Noel Smethurst voiced our thanks. A dishevilled Sergeant at Arms said a little and did even less.

On the 15th a film and talk by Michael Ajello on the subject of patents and trademarks was adjudged a success and from the number and scope of the questions, it was clear that members were keen on receiving free advice. Michael said that most patents eveolve from R&D teams and are the result of long and laborious work. There are some 30,000 applications in the UK each year handled by 1,200 patent agents and some 250 per week or 13,000 a year are successful. An invention must be brand new and not an item which has already been manufactured. He also defined the criteria by which design, copyright and trademarks are granted. Bulletin Report - PolioPlus Campaign

On this occasion I have taken off my Treasurer's hat and I am wearing my PolioPlus committee chairman's hat. I recently attended a talk by Eddie Arstall, who is in charge of PolioPlus for District 105, which was given at the Rotary District Assembly and my committee have had a meeting with the Hazel Grove committee with whom we are combining for our main fund raising event. The purpose of this newsletter is therefore twofold; first of all to give a brief background to the Campaign and secondly to bring you up to date with the latest developments in our own club effort.

The PolioPlus Campaign is a world wide Rotary campaign to raise US\$120 million (or £80 million) to eliminate polio in the third world countries and will be run over the next four years. At the same time the World Health Organisation and UNICEF will be running a parallel effort to carry out immunisation against the other major diseases namely measles, diphtheria, tuberculosis, tetanus and whooping cough. It has been calculated that the cost of each polio vaccination is only 7p so you can appreciate the vast numbers of children who will receive the vaccine. The target amount to be raised per head of Rotarian members is £100 which means that our club will be expected to produce a sum of £3,000 but any sums above that will be gladly received. Obviously the full commitment of every member is essential, as this has to be an extra effort over and above our needs to serve the local community.

At the District Assembly meeting Eddie Arstall advised us that the Government have already committed £1m to the appeal and a further £1m has been donated by the Girl Guides organisation and it was suggested that we should bear in mind reciprocal help to any local Girl Guides Club whenever an opportunity arises. (There is however, no commitment to vote Conservatve at the next election!) Attempts are to be made to raise donations of a minimum of £5,000 each from large business organisations so if any of your are well in with Messrs Sieff, Halpern or Conron - or their wives or their mistresses - please let me know. It is also hoped that a major personality, probably from Royalty, will act as a figurehead for the Campaign.

However, on a more mundane level there was a discussion as to whether we should set a District target or an individual club target and the consensus of opinion seemed to be for the latter. A District committee of eight was formed to oversee the Campaign over the next four years (I managed to avoid this!) and to produce suitable fund raising ideas and supporting publicity material. We were asked to stress that every penny raised would go to the appeal. Although, worldwide, marketing experts are to be employed they will be paid solely out of interest earned on the funds collected.

Turning now to our own campaign, we are hoping to raise the bulk of our funds from a house to house collection run in conjunction with Hazel Grove Club. They ran a similar venture ten years ago covering both Hazel Grove and Bramhall so a lot of the groundwork has already been covered. It was proposed at our joint committee meeting that we should collect in Bramhall and they will cover Hazel Grove but the total funds should be devided 50/50 between the clubs. If either club experiences difficulty on a manpower front then the other club should be prepared to give assistance.

It is hoped to arrange for the Bramhall High School 5th and 6th form pupils to distribute the envelopes on the 25th/26th and 27th September. We would then have two weeks from the 28th September to the 11th October inclusive to collect the envelopes. It is envisaged that each member will be given a round of about 260 houses and he can call on the help of his wife and/or one or two reliable friends to help. It is hoped to arrange a night at the Deanwater with Hazel Grove Club for counting the proceeds on Tuesday 13th October. Also we hope to arrange a joint venture with Hazel Grove to raise funds to cover our costs.

We have been offered display facilities for two weeks from the 9th May in the Woolwich Building Society window in Bramhall, but unfortunately, I have been unable to get any decent publicity material for the campaign. We will, however, do the best we can and use the opportunity to bring the formation of our club to the attention of the local population.

If you are still reading this and have not used the paper to light your fire, wear under your vests to keep out the Summer cold, or do whatever else with it you might think suitable, then please make a commitment to this Campaign. If you require any further information I do have some literature that can be passed around. Further reports will appear in future bulletins. (Order your copies in advance!)
