My Jobs - John Knowles

23 members were present on 9th August at what was to be one of the best job talks we have ever had. Doreen, a new waitress, looked after us as our regulars were all on holiday. The new Bulletin and RIBI magazine were distributed.

John was not satisfied with just "my job" and wanted to tell us about "my jobs". This he proceeded to do in an entertaining and anecdotal style. Brought up in the Wirral, and educated in Cumbria his first job was as a TV and radio salesman in Liverpool. With this foundation he went on to study physics at Manchester and then to Oxford to qualify as a teacher. This he did with spectacular success, teaching at Mill Hill, Oxford, Berkshire and Watford. At the same time his musical involvement included singing, conducting and playing the organ, Sailing was another key interest. He did an MSc in theoretical nuclear physics and became Chief Examiner for Physics exam papers. After an early introduction to and use of computers he went to Blackburn to be Deputy Head, and on to Birmingham as Head of a sort of 7-school co-op! This was quite a political job and John met many important politicians. During his period John's calling got too strong and he went "back to school" to study to become ordained. Thus he was simultaneously a headmaster during the day and a pupil in the evenings! He move to Scotland where he ran a 2,000 pupil independent school until 18 months ago when he came to Woodford to be the Bishop of Chester's head of Readers, and also the Vicar of Woodford.

John's talk was greeted with huge spontaneous applause, which was repeated after the vote of thanks given by Tim.

Bikes for Africa

What could have been an embarrassing time on 16th August (speaker Yogi Sharma never came to speak on Bikes for Africa!), turned out to be one of those splendid evenings – full of Rotary promise! We started with the new system of booking our meals on paying, to facilitate Carl's preparation of meals. All 28 present cottoned-on quickly, which shows that not all our brain cells are dormant.

David Dewhurst had been researching sending cycles to Africa on behalf of the club's International Committee and had been down to a small company in Colchester to see what's what. His presentation was supported by some slides that ably demonstrated the tremendous need for, and versatility of, cycles in several poor countries. Cycles were adapted into carriers of heavy loads, to rural multi-passenger vehicles, to school transports – and bikes for all ages were useful. Unwanted bikes were cleaned up and sent by the container load to several countries. The bikes were sold for about £8 each, which covered the costs of getting them there, and this was also a disincentive to their new owners just selling them straightaway at a profit. Some bikes were refurbished and sold in the UK to generate funds to run the lean company in Colchester. So far about 20,000 bikes had been sent and put to good use overseas.

This scheme seemed to be an ideal Rotary venture and David was rightly applauded on his initiative in researching it. David promised to look into details further, prior to the club adopting it as a major activity. Lots of ideas for implementing it were raised and it seems to have the enthusiastic support of the club already!

The business part of the evening was brief. Treasurer Burch (now of Prestbury) appealed for subs, Yule-the-sales sold car stickers and badges, whilst social-Rabone organised the club trip to Rainow on 23rd August. Henry asked all to donate regularly to Rotary Foundation by a Gift Aided direct debit of £5 per month, and forms to effect this were distributed. The PRO had had success in publicising our efforts in the local press and President Gordon suggested that we had another 'navel-looking' evening sometime to review how we did things.

Tim Sheppard won the wine and Ron M. prised 50p's off nearly everyone. A good evening!
