For the third week running attendance at the meeting was high with twenty-two people present for the meal including future member Archana and her friend Ranjit. David, Ashok and Denise joined us after the meal making twenty-five in all. It was very noticeable that the higher numbers and new faces led to lively discussion and even a bit of a buzz in the room.

Vice President Lesley told us that she was working hard trying to spread the word that we have lots of fun and a lot of interesting talks at our meetings as well as doing good work, by reporting our social events and speaker meetings on Facebook. A really good idea. Well done, Lesley.

Secretary Michael had nothing to report... but he has not been idle, far from it.

Communications Michael has been very active on Facebook and in local publications promoting our Table Top sale, David's concert, Wrap Up and the fashion show and now he has to start on Christmas.

# Wed 18th October - Paul Richards - Stockport Town Centre Redevelopment

17 (14 members, speaker and 2 guests) enjoyed the usual good fare and were joined by 3 more after the meal.

Steve updated us on the arrangements for the funeral of John Sykes and would soon be sending to all in an email.

Satish announced that Hazel Grove High School will be entering two teams in Youth Speaks both in 2024 and 2025.

Steve announced that Nisa has donated £350 towards Santa's sweets. Together with the £500 already donated this means we pretty well have sweet costs covered.

President Pat reminded us that the Maia singers/KEMS band "Cool Classics" concert is on Saturday.

Paul Richards began his talk by saying he had achieved a life ambition by having the world's longest job title. It begins "Director Development and Regeneration" and goes on a lot!

He summarised Stockport as moving from a traditional market town in the 1970s through various stages to 2012 when the council bought the failing Grand Central and developed Stockport Exchange, Redrock Leisure Facility, Aurora Industrial Estate and the Markets and Underbank amongst others. Today there is £400m of construction under way and Stockport is recognised at home and overseas as a leader in regeneration.

Paul's responsibilities are very wide ranging and his fast paced talk covered a staggering array of projects and plans. Here are some topics covered (and I am certain I missed some!)

- New Retail
- New Offices (some at level 1 where shops will no longer go)
- Pop up shops (some then stay)
- Lots of street art
- Lots of green space (inc green walls)
- Lots of new homes
- Intent to move Stepping Hill to town centre
- Lots of events (eg crazy races, frog trail) and activities to draw people in
- Stockport Interchange (much more than a bus station)
- Weir Mill
- Sources of funding (local, national, regional, private)
- Town of culture 23/24
- Video of Keep Brilliant Businesses Bouncing

# Thurs 26th October - Charter Night

President Pat welcomed 64 assembled guests which included District Governor Swati Mukherjee and Roxanne Suratag also from District as well as Presidents of 3 Rotary Clubs and members led by namely Paul Almond, Cheadle, Mike Coleman, New Mills and Ken Hazeldine Poynton, guests and friends to 37th CHARTER NIGHT of Bramhall & Woodford Rotary at The Deanwater Hotel. It was indeed the largest attendance to Bramhall & Woodford Rotary function.

Following an enjoyable fare District Governor Swati Mukherjee delivered a historical background prior to establishment of The Deanwater Hotel in 1965. It was the hotel which welcomed Rotary Clubs which have held meetings namely Cheadle, Hazel Grove, Bramhall & Woodford, Poynton and Wilmslow and District. It has also been the place for holding ROTARY YOUTH SPEAKS HEATS in years gone by and spearhead by Ian Bradley of Wilmslow Club. The Deanwater Hotel has also been a popular hotel for wedding receptions. Following Swati Mukherjee's background introduction to The Deanwater, she raised farewell toast to The Deanwater and Staff.

This was followed by our newest member Philip Morris to read CHARTER granted to Bramhall & Woodford Rotary Club on 24/06/1986 and Michael Lacey also proposed a Special Toast to John Meeus of being the first President of Bramhall & Woodford Rotary Club and which met at The Deanwater Hotel 37 years ago.

Following a comfort break, Sue, our extraordinary Social Functions organiser introduced our after dinner speaker Simon Michael who enlightened the audience of

his Jewish background as pace setter from Spain in 1492. Over the years family having moved to & from other countries, they decided to settle in Britain and put their domicile in London Borough Barnet. Following his grammar schooling, he entered London University to study Law. His ambition was to enter Barrister Career which unlike others was not easy as other entrants had been to public schools and had wealthy families. Simon, because of his own financial situation thus applied to Middle Temple Hall as it offered BURSARY. Simon also enlightened on various archaic and strongly held practices and having to undertake unsavoury jobs such as cleaning car during his own pupillage. In 1978 Simon indeed got his WIG. He went to inform audience of widespread corruption in metropolitan police in London and illustrated by quoting some cases. He retired from his Criminal Law Practice and embarked on a Literary Career in late 1980s. He now has written few books and widely sought after DINNER SPEAKER.

#### Wed 1st November - Committees

There were 21 Rotarians present and two guests, Ranjit Lall and Peter Crossen. Our newest Rotarian, Archana was inducted by President Pat and she was warmly welcomed by club members. This was our last but one night at the Deanwater and, as usual, the food was good and plentiful. During dinner the Christmas float rota was shared in the hopes that it would be populated! Committees reported:

**Vice President** – Leslie has been busy posting on Face Book (FB) to attract new members. Leslie also put out a request for members to join her at the Rotary District Conference in Llandudno on April 25<sup>th</sup> 2024.

**Secretary & Communications** - Michael sends out the Friday Rotary emails each week. There was a request for a volunteer to set up a WhatsApp group for digital ambassadors to follow up on FB posts.

**Treasurer** – Steve reported being busy during October with cash flow. At present the general account has £1,558. The tabletop sale realised £500 with a possible addition of another £100 in donations – all proceeds to End Polio Now. David's concert realised over £800 but due to complications / expenses there is only about £750 for the charity, Just Ice Poynton. Currently the charity account has around £560 which is a low figure for the club. Hopefully the forthcoming fashion show will generate much needed income.

**Club Services** – Bob has been very busy exploring lots of different venues now that the Deanwater is closing. The Alma Lodge appears to offer the best overall venue. We will go there for a couple of meetings before Christmas, after which time we will need to decide about the future meeting venue. Discussions ensued about how best to pay for the meal and Council will consider the problem.

**Social** – Sue was pleased with the recent Charter evening, and it broke even. Next Wednesday a trip around Bramall Hall has been arranged with Worsley RC and lunch will be in the cafe afterwards. The Christmas party will be on Friday December 15<sup>th</sup> at Bramhall Golf Club at a cost of £27 pp. Further details will follow. Chads Theatre evening is planned for January 26<sup>th</sup> 2024.

**Ways & Means** – Maggie said that the tabletop sale went well and raised nearly £600 for End Polio Now. There are three sponsors for the Christmas Santa Float, contributing £1,000 in total. However, we really could do with an additional £1,000 to meet the expenses. The proceeds for the fashion show should help with funds. All are invited to pack sweets at the Hill's on Friday evening Nov 24<sup>th</sup>, a lovely start to the Christmas festivities.

*Float* – Rotary now want all Santa floats to provide a seat belt for Santa whilst he is riding on the float. We are in urgent need of drivers for the float. Greenscape services are lending us their van to pull the float. Out of the 15 charities invited to take part in the Christmas float 8 have responded.

**Duck Race** - There are major problems and much uncertainty surrounding our annual Duck Race for 2024. The Council are very secretive about the issue, and it will not be resolved until the end of March 2024. However, it is 'likely' but 'not certain' to take place on May 19<sup>th</sup> 2024 and will probably only involve the use of the lower field. Currently, however, the Council is not accepting applications for any events/functions in Bramhall Park. This uncertainty makes planning extremely difficult and so a further Duck Race meeting is to be convened.

David Hurd of 'I Love Bramhall' wants to brighten up and make the roundabout on Bramhall Lane much more festive for Christmas and there was a suggestion for our club contribute something to help.

**Community** – David was pleased with the results of our Rotary Wrap Up and collected 185 pieces and overall Stockport totalled 601 pieces, a great achievement. He expressed thanks to all who helped and attended the concert. There was a request for volunteers to join David's Community committee as he needs more help.

Youth Speaks – Satish said that Hazel Grove HS will be entering two teams.

**International** – Harry explained that the club had donated £1,000 for fences for a school in Uganda and the fencing was now completed. A two-to-three-week trip to Uganda has been arranged for February  $5^{th}$  2024.

Ian explained that a community service award will be given to Bramhall post office as over time they have collected coins for us which has generated about £650. Recently a family (not Rotarians) have donated coins to B&W Rotary which should raise about £9,300. Well done lan for instigating this amazing donation.

# Wed 15th November - Rotary memories

There were 19 members and 3 guests in attendance, at this our last meeting at the Deanwater Hotel.

Bob reminded everyone that for next week's meeting at the Alma Lodge the cost of the meal, £16, must be paid in cash. The meals will be ordered in the usual way, via the club's web site, and all meals ordered will have to be paid for even if the person cannot attend.

Dennis had invited members to share their special Rotary experiences which were as follows:

**Chris** has very much enjoyed the international nights and many years ago one of these was attended by a student at Manchester University from Lagos. They became friends although Chris was rather jealous when some years later the former student arrived at their house driving a Bentley Continental.

**Peter** related a story about his favourite holiday to Disneyworld, Florida where he swam with dolphins.

**Sarah** joined Rotary as a Rotaractor and has been on three international events. She attended a Peace conference in Sweden, visited the USA as a Foundation Scholar and took part in a Group Study Exchange. Sarah felt she had benefitted greatly from Rotary's exchange programmes.

**Dennis** and the club were aware that in 1992 Poland was still a very poor country and with the help of a local plumber from Plonsk, near Warsaw, they decided to take some medical supplies to his hometown. The club collected the supplies and set off with two fully laden large vans to Felixtowe. They drove in relays 700 miles across Germany and Poland to Plonsk where they visited the local hospital to distribute the supplies and met local Rotarians.

**Sue** contacted an old friend, Carol, as they had both been VSO teachers in Uganda. Carol was an active Rotarian in Kasese in Uganda. In 2012 Sue won a Rotary Friendship Exchange competition to obtain air miles for two people to visit each other. Kasese RC President, Albert and VP Millie then came to visit us and were hosted by B&W Rotarians. This was the start of our long collaboration with Kasese RC and since then we have visited them twice and have sent money to support their project of improving the very poor local village of Lhuhwahwa. B&W also won another competition with their video of the exchange visit.

**John** Meeus had helped organise a train trip Cheadle Hulme to London for 400 people to raise funds. This was a great success and so a second trip was organised. This was a great day out but unfortunately the engine driver was not aware that he had to stop at Cheadle Hulme. He eventually stopped at Stockport but the next train to Cheadle Hulme could only accommodate a fraction of the passengers. The trip lost £600!

**Robert** Cryer was twice President of his former club of Hazel Grove and thoroughly enjoyed his time there. He found that when you said you were a Rotarian you were treated with respect.

**Maggie** was initially rather wary of Rotary as it was a predominantly male organisation but when she was asked to design a new Santa Float, she really felt part of the organisation and thoroughly enjoys taking the Float out.

**Michael** joined Rotary in 1985 with the Poynton Club. In 2005 when he was President, he attended the International Convention in Chicago on Rotary's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

**Tony** joined the Hazel Grove club 20 years ago. He has visited twinned clubs in Greece and Belgrade where they helped children in care and in hospital.

Dennis closed the talks by telling of a visit he made to the Rotary Club in George Town, Penang while on a business trip. He was most impressed that the club paid for the costs of poorer students to sit their exams.

We were joined by 15 to eat and Ashok joined after dinner, and a visitor with Chris Monkhouse Mr Archie Bishop. The after dinner talk was by Jim Williams introduced by Satish. What an interesting character. He has several talks up his proverbial sleeve, but we were entranced by his wealth of knowledge re the Art forgers starting back to the days of the Mona Lisa. This particular one was first stolen in 1911 and returned in 1913 surrounded by controversy as 6 paintings were done and circulated , did they have the original back WHO KNOWS !!!. Jim explained that in the early days it wasn't so much done in malice but a need to feed their families, and famous artists did teach students in there style and to help fund them sometimes signed their work to get a better price for them.

The irony of this trade was the Agents of these artists and forgers were the wealthy ones overall. The most faked artist was Carot he painted 3000 pictures in his life time plenty to fake.

Bramhall & Woodford Rotary Club met for the first time at the Alma Lodge Hotel on Wednesday 22nd November 2023. Vice President, Lesley Buckley welcomed 13 members, Archie Bishop,friend of Chris Monkhouse and our guest Speaker Jim Williams. After an excellent meal we were joined by Ashok. Satish introduced our Speaker Jim Williams, a retired Barrister who had become an established writer of historical mysteries as well as of murders. He is well sought after dinner speaker and a precis of his 16 LECTURES includes GREAT FORGERS, GREAT IMPOSTERS and THE ASSASINATION OF JOHN KENNEDY. Jim Williams delivered an excellent talk on Great Forgers who included HanVan Megeren ( Painter & Art Dealer 1889-1947; Vermeer 1937 Painting over a canvas; forger Elmer Dettory (1905-1976); Literary Forgeries Howard Hughes (1905-1976) to name a few. Jim Williams is of the opinion that Great Forgers made three points that

1) Art is an economic activity for artist

2) Middle men will always try to skim the profits 3)And value of a piece of art lies not in the work but story you tell about it.

After the talk and many Qs & As, the Vice President Lesley thanked Jim Williams for a very extensive explanatory delivery of his Talk on Great Forgers.
