

President Pat Holmes welcomed Rotarians

Treasurer: Steve advised that the bank account balances were: General Account £1,511 and Charity Account £ 4,566 and congratulated Lyn, our next treasurer, for identifying an additional £1,500 gift aid money, which could be reclaimed.

Ways and Means: Maggie Hill advised that the Fashion Show at Notcutts made £953, which would be donated to the North West Air Ambulance Service. The Notcutts staff had been particularly hospitable and as a result a music evening was being considered with possibly Richard's band, a Brazilian band and the Walthew House steel band.

Maggie and Ian were progressing well with the Duck race event on 19 th May with both levels at Bramhall Park now available to us. The charity recipients were still to be decided. The first aid staff had agreed to come and a response from the A&E nurse was awaited. Ian is putting up the signs and invitations to buy tickets were being sent out. Volunteers were being sought to man ticket sales stalls as usual. A volunteer was being sought to go into the river and again succession planning generally was mentioned. Prizes were being sought. 10 April - Jonathan Billings- Engage, Grow, Go Charity

Hello Rotarians. We had 14 attended for dinner on the 10/04/24 and 6 attended after dinner to hear the splendid talk by Johnathan Billings from EGG, Engage Grow and Go. He has 24 years experience in the Homeless Charity World, and his first job was at Wellspring here in Stockport. He moved on in 2021 to form the EGG charity focusing on housing, rehabilitation and a back to work ethic. He explained that his clients have to be motivated to be on their programme and it is yielding great results. They have partnered with some Major companies for Instance Music Magpie, Amazon , and BMW who are sponsoring as well as offering job opportunities for his clientele.

They are also involved with a Stockport company that produces Modular housing the size of a shipping container. They are hoping to secure 7 of these and are in talks with the Manchester Mayor to secure a brown field site. They will live rent free to for a specified time but must save and be in full time employment, it is aimed at allowing financial stability to move on and allow the next client to move in. The concept has been called the Hatchery great name great concept.

David announced the charity for the Duck Race Stockport Without Abuse.

Harry reminded us about the Plant Sale on the 17th at Bramhall Hall 10 till 4 proceeds to the Friend's of Bramhall Hall and Gardens.

Myself, Maggie, Bob and Sue, attended the Poynton Rotary club night on the 11th. A very warm welcome was extended. We listened to an update from their Event Planner Alex for Party in the Park. 18 April - Avro Heritage Museum Tour

There were 14 of us who met at the Avro Heritage Museum for a buffet lunch followed by their 'Silver' guided tour package.

On arrival we were greeted by the museum's Adult Group Tour Guide Manager, Trevor Pile and his team of specialist guides. After a health and safety briefing, we were treated to a delicious freshly made buffet lunch consisting of freshly prepared sandwiches, sausage rolls, cocktail sausages, pasta salad, minted potatoes, nibbles and cake.

We were then split into 2 groups of 7, with Group 1 touring the exhibition hall for approximately 50 minutes, whilst Group 2 were split into 3 smaller groups so that they could visit the Vulcan and Lancaster cockpits, as well as the Nimrod Station.

An hour later the groups swapped over so that everyone had the full experience.

The exhibition tour gave us an in-depth history of Avro, how and where the aircraft were made, as well as the development of the succeeding companies. There were many amazing and unique facts about AVRO, but one particular nugget that stood out for me, was that AVRO was an equal opportunities employee, with women doing the same jobs and men, including flying and delivering aircraft, as well as being paid the same as men.

As the weather was bad, we were unable to view the Vulcan and Nimrod cockpits, which are outside, therefore we viewed the Lancaster replica RS5868 cockpit. All cockpits are described below:

Lancaster replica cockpit: RS5868 'S Sugar' is one of 35 Lancasters which completed over 100 sorties during WWII. The replica on display is an accurate representation of the original airframe filled with genuine Lancaster instrumentation.

Vickers VC10 XV106: The VC10 was an extremely versatile aircraft which still holds the record for the fastest sub-sonic crossing of the Atlantic. The aircraft carried out important duties including medical evacuation from modern warzones and carrying VIP passengers.

Hawker Siddeley Nimrod MR2: The Nimrod MR2 was arguably the most advanced multi role maritime aircraft of its time. It had the capability to detect, fix and destroy submerged submarines, carry out reconnaissance duties, and perform search and rescue operation

The museum and all aspects of the tour have been meticulously put together and the incredible enthusiasm and knowledge of the volunteer guides (Steve, Alister, Roger, Ray, Martyn and Brian) made the afternoon extra special.

To say that we learnt so much would be an understatement and it was wonderful to see certain members of the group looking as excited as teenage boys with new toys, when they were able to sit in the cockpits, take on the role of pilot, navigator or gunner, whilst playing with the numerous switches, buttons, and dials.

After the tours we had some free time to explore and departed around 4.00pm.

24 April - John Hancock - Macclesfield Ukrainian Aid

16 of us enjoyed a choice of either Spaghetti Bolognese, Bangers & Mash or Mushroom Risotto. Several more members joined us after the meal.

After the meal we were treated to a truly wonderful and inspiring example of how ordinary people can do quite extraordinary things and commit totally to working for the benefit of others.



Who we are

- · Macclesfield Ukrainian Aid
- A group of like- minded people
- Started a volunteer group in February 2022
- Formalised ourselves in January 2024 as a not-for-profit Community Interest Company



Anne's father, who died in 1992, was they thought, from Poland, but research some years ago, traced him to Krasne, a village in Ukraine. Visits there subsequently revealed many cousins in the area, and hence their close interest in Ukraine began.

With their son Tom, the chairman, they set up Macclesfield Ukrainian Aid very early in the conflict which started in February 2022. Remarkably, they anticipated what was likely to happen and started to use Tom's industrial unit in Macclesfield. This was quickly filled with a wide variety of goods, even including baby food. All this had to be sorted, boxed and palleted. A call for volunteers resulted in over 70 being recruited in the first 2 weeks.

We were given some of the awful 'numbers' in the war, which included, amongst others-

- 400 International treaties broken by Russia
- 31,000 people unaccounted for
- 420,000 Russian casualties
- 3.7million people internally displaced
- 14.6 million in need of humanitarian assistance according to the United Nations

Contact with Anne's village gave them an indication of what would be needed, principally amongst which, was a need for vehicles. Only 10-15% of people in Ukraine own a vehicle. To distribute aid, in its many forms, to where it was needed, and bring the wounded back to relative safety in Western Ukraine, a lot of vans would be required.

They collect aid from hospitals, other aid groups and the public. Many of the hospital supplies are 'time expired' and would otherwise be scrapped. The vehicles in which they deliver it to Ukraine, are then left there.

So far, they have -

- Made 25 trips,
- Delivered 134 vehicles,
- £3.5 million in aid,
- Driven 180,000 miles by
- Recruited 70 volunteer driver's
- Filled 7 forty-foot artic lorries.

The Big One - Jan/Feb 2023 M.U.A Trip Alpha – 8 vehicles driven from Macclesfield to Krakow departed on a Saturday, drivers flew back from Krakow Bravo – 10 vehicles, same route, the following Tuesday (2 vehicles went on to Lviv, using Krakovets border post) · Charlie left Sat 10 vehicles, to Krakow picking up 10 Alpha and Bravo vehicles and drove to a hotel 1 hour from the Delta team 6 people flew to Krakow and picked up the remaining 8 vehicles we all met in the hotel about 1 hour from the border 25 vehicles went to Lviv the following day

Amongst the Aid sent –

- An entire operating theatre to replace one the Russians stole from Kherson when they retreated.
- Tyres for 20 ambulances in Kharkiv
- Cordura shrapnel-proof cloth to make children's clothes.
- Seeds and hand tools.

All Aid is delivered to known recipients to avoid any going 'missing'! In June 2023 they sent a minibus to Krasne (near Lviv) and has now covered 50,000 miles in 6 months. It is used by 14 volunteers to take Aid to troops, bring soldiers home on leave and bring the dead back for burial. Ukraine is a very large country, some 1.500km across.

This report only gives a brief overview of an inspiring talk over an hour long (it could have been 10 hours, we were assured!!).

I am certain that we all in awe of how much has been achieved in just 2 years.

The penultimate slide asked for help. They have a Supporters Group, donations to which can be made by monthly standing orders of £10 (or more!). This is to help them pay their regular outgoings, including insurance. The Club had already, as mentioned in previous emails, agreed to donate £1,000 to this immensely worthwhile operation. Other Rotary Clubs in the area are also helping, and these include Cheadle Royal and Leek with the objective of sending another van over. They do need though, a regular cash income.

The final slide, put the huge number of Ukrainian (and a few other nations) dead, into a visual representation in a park. Each Ukrainian flag representing a life lost, and there were tens of thousands.

Duck race plans are progressing nicely but there are a few problems to solve.

All 60 of the new giant ducks purchased this year were sold and together with the re-entered ducks we have over 110 giant ducks racing.

Unexpectedly ticket sales for small ducks started really well in Bramhall Village on Saturday and plan is to have an extra sales day at the weekend.

Fliers will be distributed by Richard and Bob to all Bramhall and Cheadle Hulme Schools.

The banners have been updated and Steve and John have offered to put them up. Posters have been put up in many Bramhall shops and will be displayed in Cheadle Hulme this week.

We have more stalls than ever at this event this year with the Workers Bbe Market providing over 50 in the walled garden and several more than usual on the Hall courtyard.

Volunteers are a work in progress with many of last year's returning but many not, especially other Rotary clubs.

Our Charity, Stockport Without Abuse is providing 10.

If anyone can persuade friends or family to come along and help us please let Maggie know asap so that they can be assigned jobs.

In response to our recent emails concerning insurance and safeguarding the public, Maggie has produced maps showing all exits from the park, all routes out of the park, position of all First Aid sites and all PA systems as well as the postcode for the park and lower field entrance. All Rotarians on site and all SWA volunteers should have a map so that in the event of an emergency they can easily direct the public to the exits or call an ambulance.

Marshalls for all 5 major areas of the park who will have walkie talkies are named on the reverse of the map.

lan will be checking that all hot food outlets have fire extinguishers and Denise will be ensuring a clear way through the lower field in case an ambulance needs to drive in.

We are still struggling to find vans to carry what we need to the park.

Next event, Caribbean Cruise Evening, Notcutts Garden centre restaurant, Wednesday 19 th June, 6.30 pm.

Two course meal, Rio Cinco, Steel Band, Mexican dancers, table magician, beachwear show, Captains table and more. Cost around £32.

Please start asking people to attend .It should be a fantastic night A good turnout of Rotarians and friends would be very welcome.

Treasurer's report

Steve reported that the General account has an available balance of £1461. With regard to the Charity account, Duck Race funds are now flowing in and out of the account. Receipts to date amount to £4100 and payments to suppliers are £3800 with further pre-event expenditure estimated at £3300.

Current provisions are £3500 for possible Float repairs and £1000 contribution for the mini bus for Ukraine. The result is an available balance on the Charity account at present of £3826.

President Pat opened the meeting at the Alma Lodge Hotel at 1930. A total of 11 members were seated for supper, with another 9 members joining later. So, overall a decent attendance for the last meeting before the main fundraiser of the year - the DUCK RACE!

At 2030 Maggie took the floor (prompted by Dennis, to get business started) to brief those assembled on the current status of the Duck Race planning.

Over 80 personnel, including B&W members are involved, but there were still gaps in the jobs list. Of concern was the lack of support to clear up at the end of the event and urged people to stay back and help where possible. Helpers attention was drawn to the Safety plan of the Park which has 5 nominated Marshalls who will co-ordinate an evacuation in the event of an emergency. Of note are the postcodes to pass to emergency services - SK7 3NX for the park in general and SK7 3AB for the entrance near Brookdale Theatre.

Free programmes which have been re-vamped, are available at the duck race ticket sale desk. Maggie concluded at 2100 and was thanked for her tremendous efforts.

lan then took the floor to brief on the entertainments programme, which has one slot on stage still empty, but otherwise a great programme. Archana offered to look at sourcing a Bollywood dance troupe to fill the above slot.

It was also mentioned that food & drink vouchers were exclusively for the Scouts and High School helpers and not for adults.

I think this is an important issue since phones are unreliable in the Park, to say the least, and running from the Hall to the lower field is very time consuming.

Duck Race De-brief 2024

The first thing to say is that Sunday was another great success as far as the public were concerned and we should have made a substantial amount of money for Stockport Without Abuse. On the whole there were lots of smiling faces around the whole park and everyone seemed to be enjoying themselves. There have been plenty of lovely comments on social media and out on the street and I haven't heard any adverse comments.

Despite the glorious weather there were fewer visitors this year than in past years. Talking to people in the run up to the day it was troubling that maybe 90% of them didn't know about the Duck Race. Even on the day there were people who had just come to the park by chance and afterwards people saying, has there been an event on today. The fliers were very late going out at the schools it seems. Having asked children of various ages many hadn't had them. WE NEED TO HAVE THE FLIERS OUT EARLIER TO GIVE SCHOOLS TIME TO GIVE THEM OUT AND TO GIVE PARENTS TIME TO PLAN THEIR WEEK ENDS IN ADVANCE. MAYBE WE SHOULD ASK VARIOUS MEMBERS WHO USE FACE BOOK TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR JOINING GROUPS AND SHARING DUCK RACE INFORMATION. IT DIDN'T SEEM TO BE OUT THERE THIS YEAR.

This wasn't our finest Duck Race as far as organisation was concerned. Many things could have gone better but there WERE mitigating circumstances. The main problem being that we were very late in organising everything. This was a year of unfortunate incidents to say the least. We had 3 vans lined up for us transporting goods to the field and all 3 fell through. Mia James have both their vans in the garage for repair and worse still, our driver from last year died suddenly at the age of 44. Our lovely A and E nurse who had promised to man the lower field first aid tent all day had a fall and broke her back in 3 places.

These setbacks were overcome at the last minute through lots of networking with Jonathan Tew, the manager of Notcutts, offering not only his van but himself as well and doing an enormous amount of physical work for us.

One thing which we couldn't control was the weather. Obviously we were incredibly lucky to have a glorious day but sadly there had been too much rain and not enough sunny weather to dry out the lower field making it impossible to place stallholders and our own marquees where it had been planned that they should go. We had done a recce of the field a few days earlier and estimated that with a few sunny days it would be dry. We were wrong. We checked the river on the Saturday and got overhanging trees removed but didn't check the field again. Clearly we should have done to be forewarned of its condition. NEXT TIME WE MUST CHECK THE FIELD THE DAY BEFORE AND REVISE STALL POSITIONS IF NECESSARY.

lan and I were both guilty of not providing Denise and Sheila with enough information about what stalls would be coming to the lower field and where they should go as we have done in the past which caused a bit of chaos and resulted in Sheila who has helped us for years, saying that she won't be helping again. NEXT TIME WE MUST HAVE A DETAILED MAP SHOWING WHICH PITCH EACH STALL HAS BEEN ALLOCATED AND THE STALLS NEED TO BE TOLD BEFORE HAND.

The tote was also chaotic despite very valiant efforts of Kate and Sheila. We didn't know until the last minute that John T and his son Andrew who always run the tote could not be with us. HOPEFULLY THIS WILL BE RESOLVED NEXT YEAR BY EITHER ANDREW COMING BACK TO HELP US OR WE HAVE TEAM TRAINED ON THE TOTE WORKINGS BEFORE HAND.

Part of the problem at the Duck tent and the tote was that the results of the races were not getting to them and we had nobody responsible for actually recording all the winners. It seemed to work well in the morning and then Dale was having to do a double job in the river and recording the winners. NEXT TIME WE MUST HAVE A DESIGNATED PERSON RELAYING THE WINNERS TO THE TOTE.

We had a problem this year with people betting on ducks which were no shows and then quite rightly asking for their money back. This came about because the Duck tent and the tote were set up wrongly and people were placing their bets based on the race lists rather than on the ducks on the duck boards for that race. THIS SHOULD BE EASILY RESOLVED BY SETTING THE TOTE UP PROPERLY IN FUTURE.

We had a problem with the buses with people waiting for an hour in Cheadle Hulme and no bus turning up. BELLE VUE BUSES ARE PAYING US SOME COMPENSATION.

Many of our problems come about because we just do not have enough people working who know what needs to be done. HOPEFULLY THIS WILL IMPROVE AS NEWER MEMBERS AND PEOPLE WHO HELP EVERY YEAR RETAIN THE SAME JOBS AND NEED NO INSTRUCTION. We had some really good new helpers this year and I'm optimistic that they will help again in the future.

One good point was that the clearing up at the end of the day was done quickly and efficiently on both the top and bottom areas with many more volunteers staying behind or coming back to help.

Philip has expressed the thought that we need to buy more card readers for use on the ticket sales and the drinks sales and a really good idea, we should advertise that the profits from OUR drinks go to charity. Also that our drinks are in a more prominent position.

One last minor problem, not quite a complaint, apparently Bramall Hall had a number of people saying that we advertised that entrance to the Hall would be free. This was definitely not on the banners, the electronic poster in the Village or the posters and fliers which went out but people may have misinterpreted something written in a post or in a free paper if it said free event at Bramall Hall rather than saying in Bramhall Park so we need to choose our words very carefully.

Very well done everybody. We all worked our socks off and produced a great event. We can learn from this year's problems and sort them out if there is another Duck Race.

The evening began with 11 Rotarians gathering for dinner and they were later joined by 5 more. President Pat welcomed everyone and the atmosphere of the evening was fun and fellowship. Significant efforts are being made to publicise the forthcoming 'Caribbean Cruise' evening on Wednesday June 19th. Lesley, Maggie & Lynn had distributed leaflets at the weekend at Notcutts Garden Centre. The numbers are up to 47 but there are several other people who have said they want to attend. Organising and planning the event is made even more of a challenge when people leave buying tickets until the last minute. As there were so few of us at the start we did not break into committees and the relevant chairmen just spoke about progress of their committee or otherwise.

12 June - Jeanette Carlow - Stockport Without Abuse

About 14 members ate an excellent meal, with several other members joining later. We were joined by the CEO of Stockport Without Abuse (SWA), Samantha Higginbottom, and guest Kay Swain.

David Rose introduced Samantha, a lady with a legal background. SWA started as Women's Aid in 1975 and since then has expanded its activities considerably. SWA is the major recipient of monies from the 2024 Duck Race, and Samantha received a cheque for £12,000.

SWA aims to help families subjected to abuse of any kind, to help families resolve problems where possible and to improve the life chances of those affected. Abuse is found all over Stockport, including Bramhall, and can take many forms. In 2023/2024 there were 5457 relevant incidents in Stockport, and these included 314 perpetrators, of which 144 were high risk cases.

Badly threatened families are offered refuge accommodation away from the perpetrators and are able to access other relevant sources of help, including medical care and counselling. SWA works closely with the police and SWA were the proud recipients of a recent Police Commanders Award.

The locations of refuge accommodations are closely guarded, and entry is very severely restricted. The anger, fear and hopelessness of those affected are addressed in many ways, with the aim of enabling families to live wholesome lives once again.

Family therapy is a big, underfunded area, and our donation with enable about 15 families to receive help.

Amanda was quite surprised at the breadth and activities of Rotary worldwide, and hopefully will visit us again to learn more.

Sue Preece reminded us of the garden party on June 30th, when a £10pp charge would cover costs. About 80 people were to attend the Caribbean evening on June 19th. Bruce confirmed that the "Rotary garage" at Hillbrook was no longer under threat after a planning application at Hillbrook was accepted.

24 Members in attendance plus guests Assistant District Governor (ADG) John Shepley from the Bolton Daybreak Club, Kay Swain, Susanas Kyagaba and Michael Brown.

Steve was in loco **Michael** as emcee for an evening of fun and fellowship with friends

Outgoing President Pat reflected on "one of the best years" we've had in Rotary" before handing over the chain of office to **President Lesley**, who saluted the Club for raising more than £30,000 over the last 12 months. She said "All your endeavours have been amazing. I'm in awe of what you (we) achieve...when our cogs fit together we create a formidable wheel."

Steve handed over the – never worn during his term of office – Treasurer's chain to **Lynn**, who got straight down to business and reminded us that subs were due on Monday (1 July) of £120. And added that the charity account was looking healthy with £9261.

It was confirmed that in 2023-24 BW Rotary had raised and given out £37,000 in total. And **lan** reminded us that £1400 was also raised by other charities at the Duck Race.

Bob reported on Club Services and David on Community Services.

Maggie announced that we had raised more than £1600 at the Caribbean evening at Notcutts, which was a fabulous success. She asked for our help continuing to forge relationships with the shop owners and businesses in Bramhall village – particularly the new ones who were coming in during a time of change.

Harry reported for International, **Sue** for Social and **Sarah** (for Michael) on Media, PR and Communications. In addition, Harry drew our attention to a Foundation raffle for mental health causes...and an appeal for funds for incubators in Ukraine from the Thameside Club (the latter to be discussed at Council).

ADG John responded to what he'd heard at Assembly saying that we "were a great Club, doing great work."

He reminded us of District Governor Jean's priorities for her year of office:

- To commit to diversity, equity and inclusion
- That we have flexibility to run the Club the way we want (in terms of meeting frequency and style)
- Encouraging collaboration with neighbouring Rotary clubs in our 'cluster' and across District.
